Graham gave an update on the 1921 Census research paid for by the Goodliff Award. All data is logged and he is now preparing summaries. He confirmed that in the report he will be breaking up statistics with these summaries, villagers reminiscences and photographs of the time. One example of information found was that only one third of villagers were born in Great Paxton during that time.

Paul spoke to the group about his findings on a topic based around vagrancy. He referred to the Vagrancy Act of 1824. He read out a very detailed description of the legal definition of the term, and referred to Thomas Butler who was born here but lived nearer to Bedford. Seems that if you are not liked by someone they can report you to the police as a vagrant!

Graham then spoke about some items he has extracted from the Paxton Posts from the recent past now held in our village archives such as:-

- 1. The original plans were for the community shop to be in the pub.
- 2. Concerns about noise from the proposed wind turbines at Coton Farm.
- 3. Reports of a planning permission request for a massive solar farm off Toseland Road. Other uses for that land had been stabling, 30 houses, and a large golf course.
- 4. There were also two separate but linked history articles about the Towgood Institute by Bert Goodwin. The first informed us that the original Reading Room was in 6 London Lane as it is now called. It is believed that the Towgood family built 6 cottages in London Lane near to the High Street around the 1860s with one given over for the use of the village for meetings by such groups as the Mothers Meeting under the supervision of the Towgood daughters who lived in Paxton Hill House.
- 5. Later, around 1896, Mr Hamer Towgood bought the land on that corner and had the Towgood Institute built for the village. Games, newspapers and extra reading lessons were given, just for boys and men. Two daily newspapers were provided, as stipulated in the deeds, and these were the Daily Express and the Daily Mail. It was well used until the end of World War 2 with the vicar as the sole trustee, it is believed. Then lack of use meant that the building lay empty for many years.



The Retirement Revolution

It has now been 9 years since the Government made major changes to the regulations regarding how and when we can access our pension funds. Prior to this, we had very little choice concerning our own pension money when retiring. It was a general perception that we could not be trusted to make 'the right decision'.





Firstly, our former **District Councillor Richard West** — you might be aware that Richard resigned from Huntingdonshire District Council in March. Richard represented Great Paxton for many years and has worked hard for residents and the village and been an asset to the Parish Council. The Parish Council has extended their appreciation to Richard for his service and endeavours on our behalf and wished him well for the future. Elections for a new District Councillor will take place on 2nd May.

The Parish Council has extended a warm welcome to its newest Councillor – Simon Black, who was co-opted to the Council in March.

In other news...

Regrettably, the Parish Council's application for Community Grant (Biodiversity) was unsuccessful on this occasion although the District Council has suggested that there might be other opportunities to reapply in the future;

Thank you to Councillor Hall and his team for all their hard work to clear brambles, overgrown shrubs etc on London Lane;

Maintenance of trees on Parish Council land has been completed;

A new dog waste bin has been installed on Rectory Green; the former bin having been relocated to the Recreation Ground to replace one with a broken lid;

Our membership of the Great Ouse Valley Trust has been renewed for 2024;

A request for grant funding towards maintenance of the Churchyard from the Parochial Church Council was deferred to

the May meeting to allow it to be considered at the same time as other applications; and

The annual RoSPA inspection of the Play Space on Saxon Green will be undertaken in April.

The **Annual Parish Meeting** takes place on **Monday 20th May** starting at **7pm** on the Great Paxton School site (either the Community Room or Main Hall, depending on numbers). This is your opportunity to ask questions and raise issues of interest/concern with the Parish Council. <u>Great Paxtonians – Phillip Melville Cardell, 1917-1940.</u>

A series of articles about people who have lived in Great Paxton or have a connection with the village.

Phillip "Pip" Cardell was born at Manor Farm, Great Paxton (the farm behind the church). His family had moved from Cornwall to Great Paxton in the 1890s to farm here. It was a role and way of life that he had grown into before war broke out.



Pip joined the Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve in May 1939 as an Airman Pilot aged 21. He could have stayed in Great Paxton and worked on the land during the war but instead chose to remain with the air force when war broke out, being called up on the 1st of September 1939. He was initially sent to Scotland for flying training before

being posted to 263 Squadron at Drem, East Lothian on the 23^{rd} of August 1940. A few days later he went to 603 Squadron at Dyce, Aberdeen. The squadron then went south to Hornchurch (East London) in late August to fly Spitfires in the Battle of Britain (July 10^{th} – 31^{st} October 1940).

On September the 27th, 300 enemy planes were heading across the Channel to the south of England, it was one of the most intense days

of the conflict. Pip's squadron was scrambled and was shortly in combat with two enemy fighters, he was seen by his friend Pilot Officer Peter Dexter who joined the combat, between them they shot both down.

On the way back home, they were set upon by five enemy fighters, they managed to get away though Pip's Spitfire had been hit, Dexter saw he was in trouble. Pip bailed out a quarter of a mile out from Folkstone at 300 feet, too low for his parachute to open, he fell into the sea and surfaced. Dexter flew around trying to attract attention including going to shore and back out to show anyone on the ground that help was needed. As no help was forthcoming, Dexter made a forced landing on the beach and commandeered a boat to go out to save Pip. It had been 35 minutes since he bailed out and it was too late, the rescue had become recovery.

Phillip Cardell is buried in the corner of Great Paxton churchyard, one of "The Few".

Empty Seats – by Laura Stock

My last piece in the Paxton Post centred on the empty seats around me on my trips to our local cinema. Since then, I have discovered the 'St Neots Cinema Club', a recently founded Facebook group that has steadily garnered nearly three hundred members. The group admin picks a different cinema showing each week for group members to attend, where you are welcome to sit and watch together, or if you're slightly more socially awkward like myself, you can sit alone — but in the comfort that you are in the company of film fans like yourself. The group has been a pleasure to join, especially as it means the seats are becoming less and less empty.



I attended one of the group's selected watches of *Wicked Little Letters* at the beginning of March. In the lead role, Olivia Colman plays a devout Christian whose temptation to live freely as a woman during the suffragette movement is heavily repressed and refused by her fellow villagers, her father, and herself. As a beloved national treasure, Colman commands a natural pity in a lot of her roles, but I find her most engaging when her character has a bit (or in this film, a *lot*) of an edge to them, much like her performances in *The Favourite* (2018)

and *Empire of Light* (2022). Supporting actress Anjana Vasan stole the show for me, however, as the 'woman police officer' responsible for solving the film's mystery, and for providing most of the laughs.



My next watch was Dev Patel's directorial debut and revenge-epic *Monkey Man*. Set in the bustling streets of an Indian city, Kid (played by Patel) fights at an underground boxing club whilst wearing a monkey mask, fuelled by his desperation to avenge the murder of his mother. Kid embarks on what is nothing less than a killing spree, and fights his way into the VIP spaces of the elite where his enemies lie. The hectic nature of the narrative was similar to the Safdie brothers' heist-gone-

wrong movie *Good Time* (2017), in the way it refuses to let you catch your breath after every gory battle. Its deeper meaning was potentially lost underneath all the blood, but Kid's sensitivity amidst his thirst for revenge seemed to pay a homage to others of its genre like *Manila in the Claws of Light* (1975) – and Patel as director won't be going anywhere after the film has grossed \$20 million worldwide.



Most recently I saw *Civil War*, which, if you have seen other works by director Alex Garland, you won't be shocked to discover its content is not for the faint-hearted. If its depiction of innocent deaths and wrecked cities isn't enough, you literally cannot escape the cacophony of gun shots, bombs, and crucially – the sound of cameras clicking. The protagonists are each war-photographers, both ambitious and traumatised. Kirsten Dunst's established career as an actress

cleverly contrasts that of newcomer Cailee Spaeney, complementing their competing characters' outlooks throughout the film. We are


guided through the 'neutral' perspective of the journalists who are provided with free passes to scurry through conflict (mostly) unscathed. Rather than wondering whose side you are on, you are left attempting to differentiate the shots of the guns from that of the cameras.
