

## PAGE 3 TIPS

year round gardening tips

APRIL - Look out for weeds and remove them sooner rather than later. Weeds are always early risers in the spring and are much easier to remove while small. It's a good time to spread a mulch on the bare soil between plants to help keep the weeds down.

Protect young shoots from slugs and snails, scatter pellets / slug pubs or whatever, particularly around clematis and herbaceous plants. As soon as there are shoots to eat, slugs and snails will appear from nowhere.





Watch out for signs of aphids, another early riser. If you can spot and control aphids in the spring, then life gets an awful lot easier later on in the year. Check on the newly emerging shoots of their favourite plants.


March is the main sowing time for many plants, hardy or half-hardy, both flowers and vegetables. If you've never tried growing anything from seed, then this is a good time to start.

Lift and divide summer flowering perennials. Pull them apart gently but firmly so that the plant divides at its weakest point/s, don't cut.

If you've any rotted garden compost that's ready to use, this is a good time to place it around the more mature garden plants and trees as a thick mulch, it soon gets mixed in by the worms and continues to rot and improve the soil. The effect is not immediate, but within a year or two. Just be careful not to bury small plants with it.

MAY - As the flowers of spring flowering shrubs fade, they can be pruned back to get a good display next year. Almost anything that flowers in spring can be pruned immediately after flowering to keep them vigorous and flowering well. Ideally each year you should cut out one in three or one in four of the oldest branches down to ground level. This way the plant always has plenty of growth left and no branch is allowed to get old and past its prime. Mow the lawn regularly now, little and often is the best way to get a really good lawn.

Give your lawn a feed of fertiliser, buy a proprietary lawn feed and follow the instructions carefully. Weed, weed and thrice weed. They're coming up thick and vigorously now.



Push support stakes into the ground around emerging tall perennials. Plant up containers and hanging baskets with tender summer bedding plants

Trim quick growing hedges. They're starting to sprout well now and it helps keep them in shape before they get too unruly.

The daffodils have all been over for some time. The leaves don't need any cutting off. Remove faded flowers so that they don't put their energy into making seeds and give them a feed of double strength liquid plant food.

JUNE - Stake tall growing perennials such as Delphiniums and Lupins.

will take over the ornamental part of the plant.

Water containers regularly and check daily, particularly if there's a drying wind. To keep them looking good, water, feed and dead-head regularly for the best show.

Dead-head perennials and shrubs such as roses. This keeps them producing more flowers Look for and remove "suckers" on roses or grafted trees. These are shoots of the wild-type rootstock that the ornamental foliage is grafted onto. If left, then the rootstock being more vigorous (hence its use as rootstock)

- Children aged 5-16 £1 per journey Please choose the 'Youth' fare option when booking.
- Concessionary Bus Pass Holders and Disability Bus Pass holders travel for FREE Please choose the 'Senior' or 'Person with disability' fare option when booking and show your pass to the driver when you board.
- Tiger Pass Holders £1 per journey Please ask for the 'Reduced' fare option when booking and show your pass to the driver when you board.

You can pay using your debit or credit card when booking over the phone. Drivers are not able to accept cash or card payments.

However after a while she found her life's vocation as a Health Visitor finishing as Health Visitor Manager all over Cambridgeshire.

She married in 1972 and was with John until his sad death about five years ago.

#### **REPORT FROM YOUR PARISH COUNCIL: SPRING 2025**

Your Parish Council has met twice since the first Edition of the new 'Paxton Post'.

Main headlines from the January meeting:

#### The Parish Council has agreed to:

- Contribute 30% or £6750 of the total cost of a scheme to provide a 'single priority narrowing ' build out feature and 'Buffer Zone' at the north end of the High Street. The scheme is subject to approval by the County Council later in the year;
- Undertake a comprehensive review of Streetlighting in the Parish and appointed a small Working Group to get the project underway;
- Re-appoint MAM Garden Maintenance as its Grounds Maintenance Contractor (Grass Cutting) for the remainder of the contract until 31st March 2026
- Confirmed that the 'Paxton Post' will be issued quarterly in future and asked that the new production team should continue to seek best value for the print job. The new editor will also give regular feedback to the council.
- Given the comprehensive nature of the Scoping Report produced for the East West Rail Project, decided not to make any additional comments on the content of the Environment Statement which adequately covered all the potential impacts and significant effects of the proposed development on the local environment.

Since the January meeting, the Parish Council has met County Council Officers in the village and were informed that all potholes would be dealt with as soon as the weather improved.

We were also told that the white markings on the footpath on Towgood Way indicated that it was the County Council's intention to resurface the pavement at some point in the future.

Properties with shrubs overhanging the pavement would be asked by the County Council to do some trimming.

In March, Councillors noted that the Parish Council's application for a 20mph zone on the High Street, Mount Pleasant and Towgood Way had been refreshed and improved by the addition of new speed data for submission to the County Council by the end of the month.

Repairs to the Play Space within Saxon Green had been completed in line with recommendations after a RoSPA inspection and agreed to renew the Council's membership of the Great Ouse Valley Trust and CPRE.

A Working Group has now met to consider how to approach its review of street lighting in the village. It is keen to hear, given the cost, whether there is support from residents for extra streetlighting and where that might be located. It is possible that the Annual Parish Meeting on May 19th might be used for this discussion so please keep your eyes peeled for further publicity on this. The Parish Council want to encourage as many people as possible to get involved.

As a school, we have decided that since the vote was very close, the children will hold a fundraising


event for Cancer Research.



## GREAT PAXTON HISTORY SOCIETY

## MEET MONTHLY ALL WELCOME



On Monday the 9th June we are pleased to welcome local historian Roger Leivers who has written several books about Godmanchester, the Stirling plane that crashed there, and the 'goings on' at Farm Hall.

Roger will present a talk based around his book "Godmanchester at War"
The talk starts at 7.30 pm in The Bell marquee. All welcome. £3.50 per
person.

We recently enjoyed a presentation form Nick Tracken entitled "Looking at Buildings" Nick gave a very interesting presentation about what we

can see if we really look at buildings. Windows, doors, and brickwork can tell us a lot about

the building, but often pose more questions than answers. Many of the pictures were from local buildings with a few added from London and other places. Hidden in plain view are many fascinating places that we wish could tell their stories.



This is Cressener House in Huntingdon Street, St Neots. Behind the Georgian brick frontage there is a 15th century timber framed famhouse. The clue, apart from the wooden beams if you are lucky enough to go inside, are in the big metal 'S' brackets in between the front windows. They are tie-bars, often used to hold a new brick wall that has been built against an older wooden one. The tie-bars were made by the local blacksmith and so vary in design and size.



This double-fronted, red brick town house on the South side of St Neots Market Square was built about 1700. Made from clays that contain iron, when fired they turn red. Later on from 1890 they used clay which contained chalk, turning them yellow, such as the two newer building on either side.

Brick was used after the Great Fire of London in 1666 to try to avoid the same happening again. Regulations slowly reached the rural towns to stop building in wood, to cover the wooden front with brick and to set the window frames back from the surface, and many other rules.

Graham J found a note in the archives from Bert Goodwin about a tollhouse at the top of Paxton Hill. It was this building that was turned into the pub, known either as The Fox or The Mill. The Towgoods, who had Paxton Hill House built, were members of the Temperance Society, and they bought the pub in order to knock it down as they didn't like seeing their workers drinking. Some of the bricks from this building were used to clad one in the High Street, now demolished.

All our meetings are open to everyone. We don't charge any fees although occasionally we will have a topic, with a speaker, for which there may be a small charge.

It's a chance to talk about all things historical, local and national as well as teasing out memories from the older residents, and looking at interesting items brought along.

Our next meeting at The Bell will be June 9th for the "Godmanchester at War" talk followed by a meeting in September and then monthly ongoing for the winter period.
